Course Description:

This course continues to focus on the potter's wheel as a forming method, seeking a greater technical proficiency while beginning to develop a more creative and personal style. Emphasis is placed on the individual's growth in respect to creative design abilities.

Course Student Learning Outcome:

-Students will combine basic design with wheel formed ceramics.

Course Objectives:

- -To continue to develop ones skills on the potters wheel and in the decorating process.
- -To introduce historical and contemporary ceramic art and gain an understanding of its cultural context.
- -To challenge problem solving skills.
- -To begin to develop an individual creative process.
- -To effectively apply the principles of civility as they pertain to the classroom, the instructor and your fellow students.
- -To learn self-assessment through the critic of ones projects.

Student Learning Outcomes:

A student who earns a grade of "C" or higher will have:

- -Secured more advanced techniques of ceramic wheel throwing and the decoration process.
- -Gained a greater understanding of cultural diversity through the study of art, historical and contemporary.
- -Demonstrated an ability to think critically with an increased experience using problem solving skills.
- -Begun to develop an individual creative process, which will be seen in the art work.
- -Shown a comprehension of ones civic responsibility through appropriate civil behavior as it relates to the community.
- -Demonstrated an ability to self-assess through the analysis of ones art work.

Course Requirements and Personal Responsibility

<u>Lab Fee:</u> \$25.00 (Required payment to the bookstore)

The lab fee covers the expense of one 25-pound bag of clay, as well as glazes and firing for the semester. Prior to receiving clay to work with, each student must pay the fee to the bookstore. Additional clay may be purchased for \$7.00 a bag from the bookstore, when needed.

Attendance and Grading:

Attendance to all class meetings is required. Three late arrivals will count as one unexcused absence. More than two unexcused absences may result in the lowering of your final grade. More than three unexcused absences may result in your being dropped from the class. Work will be evaluated on craftsmanship and on meeting the requirements of the assignments. Projects will be graded as they are completed. If there is ever a concern about your grade, please come and see me.

Student Behavior and Discipline:

It is my expectation that you conduct yourself in a professional manner at all times, behaving in a polite and courteous way to both the instructor as well as to your fellow students. Grading is based upon class performance and attendance. Part of your grade will be based on craftsmanship, and part on design and creativity. The following will be the basis for determining grades in this class:

- A This grade will be earned by those students who have completed all of the required assignments, and which show technical and design **excellence**, and who have fewer than two unexcused absences from class.
- ${f B}$ This grade will be earned by those students who have completed all of the required assignments, and which show **good** creative and technical ability, and who have fewer than two unexcused absences from class.
- C This grade will be earned by those students who have completed all of the required assignments showing some creative and technical ability, and have fewer than three unexcused absences.
- **D** This grade will be earned by those students who have completed fewer than half of the required assignments, showing below average abilities, and/or who have three or more unexcused absences.
- \mathbf{F} This grade will be earned by those students who have completed only a few of the required assignments, demonstrating well below average abilities, and/or who have three or more unexcused absences.

NOTE:

You are expected to be in class on time. Three late arrivals will count as one unexcused absence. More than three unexcused absences may result in your being dropped from the class.

NOTE:

It is your responsibility to make sure that I see your finished work. Due to the firing procedures, it is not always possible to get every piece by every student into each firing. Please let me know if your work has been passed over for a firing, and I will make every effort to get it into the next firing.
