General Psychology 1 (3 Units)

Overview

This is an introductory course in psychology as the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Topics treated include roots and theories of psychology, biology of mind, sensation and perception, consciousness, motivation and emotions, learning, memory, thinking & language & intelligence, developing through the life span, gender and sexuality, stress & health & coping, psychological disorders, social psychology, and therapies

Course Requirements

Research Project

Every student must complete an APA format Research Project. The Research Project format: Title Page, Abstract, and Reference page; each page is typed, double-spacing (2.0), pages with 1" margins (top/bottom/sides), in Courier font style, and 12 point font size. You will **Need** one **approved** reference (a Psychological periodical or journal **ONLY**); no other resource is acceptable for the Research Project. Choose any *topic* from the 'Topic List' by October 1, 2014. (refer to General Information folder in Moodle shell). Finished Research Project is due November 5, 2014. **NO EXCEPTIONS!** The project is worth up to 100 points will be deducted from overall grade, if not submitted. (65 days before Project's due date). **Note: Increase GPA with EX-Assignment(s)**

Final Comprehensive Examination

There is a final exam given on December 17th 1:00 pm-3:00 pm; a Scantron (882-E) sheet is needed and a #2 pencil (preferably with eraser). This assessment will be testing comprehensively the entire course's content and will be worth up to a maximum of 100 points towards the overall grade. In order to maintain a cumulative record of your grades, keep a running total weekly. **Note: Increase GPA with EX-Assignment(s)**

EX-Assignment (Not Required-Extra Credit)

These are classroom and research assignments that will be given throughout the course that will afford each student the opportunity to add points towards their overall grade. Credit is earned for an EX-Assignment by submitting 1 (full page) [refer to attached page #3] to 2 page (maximum) Essay **describing /critiquing; not opinion or creative writing** assigned lecture/video that is given (TBA). The assignment must show a **correlation to psychological phenomena/content** that has been discussed either in class lectures and/or the class textbook that is empirically sound. These are EX-Assignment points and **ONLY** add not detract from your grade, as they are **ALWAYS** done voluntarily. **Note: Getting graded EX-Assignment(s) may take up to two weeks**

If you do not hand in the required assessments (Quizzes, Research Paper and Final) these points will be deducted from your overall grade, as they are all requirements.
