






Level of interest in receiving a baccalaureate in Dental Hygiene from West LA College



Obtaining a B.S degree greatly expands job opportunities for dental hygienist.

It will prepare me more in depth for my career. With a B.S. Degree I will be able to pursuit higher education.

I never wanted to settle for an A.S in dental hygiene- I was going to figure out a way to get my B.S eventually and I'm very happy WIa is considering it.

From an educational standpoint, I do not believe that there is much of a difference from a BS to an AS, since 2 years of the BS are general education requirements, so in the end you still take only 2 years of core classes. From an employer stand point, I believe that a BS would look better in hiring someone, but again, its just a piece of document, and that document does not show anyone what you know or don't know. The state exam is what determines your qualifications, and if you're able to pass it through an AS program rather than a BS program, then the degree should not matter.

If having the opportunity to receive a B.S. in dental hygiene i would rather be able to do this program to further my education and benefits the success in this career.

A bachelors degree will take me farther and give me more opportunities in my future. I plan to get my B.S. regardless but it would be nice to get it in Dental Hygiene from WLAC.

I feel that a B.S Degree will allow for more opportunities for growth within the dental hygiene field, such as, being able to earn a Master's Degree in order to teach aspiring dental students. Although the AS degree adequately prepares you for a career in the dental field, obtaining a BS degree in Dental Hygiene could separate one from the competitive field. More education typically means more opportunities.

I feel like a BA degree in any subject goes further, or speaks louder, and an AS degree. Speaking from experience, some employers require a BA degree for certain positions.
